Uncaged: Living in the Freedom of Grace

Forgiveness from the Heart (April 11th, 2021)

PREPARATION

- Familiarize yourself with this Study Guide.
- You can watch the sermon online HERE.
- Spend some time in prayer before your group gathers.
- You always have the option to use some or all the questions and/or prepare your own questions.

Welcome: *Icebreaker – What's the biggest risk you have ever taken in your life?*

Study Tip: In Luke 17:1-10, Jesus spends time addressing the radical nature of forgiveness. Much like today, the traditional Jewish approach places the burden of proof on the one seeking forgiveness to demonstrate that their desire to reconcile is genuine. In other words, if I can somehow prove that the perpetrator's heart is in the right place, then I will extend forgiveness. Not so in the Kingdom of God! First, pay attention to the condemnation of anyone who leads someone to sin (particularly to the "little ones") [see Matt. 18:6; Mark 9:42-50]. Each perpetrator of sin never escapes responsibility for their actions. Now, Jesus says PAY ATTENTION TO YOURSELVES! If your fellow brother sins, **rebuke** (ἐπιτιμάω) him, and if he **repents** (μετανοέω), you must forgive him! The word **rebuke** appears close to 30 times in the New Testament and would have simply meant correct or disapprove in a way that would prevent any further wrongdoing. If the person confronted repents ("changes their mind" and "turns to God") then we are commanded to forgive as many times as it takes (see Matt. 18:15-22)! Jesus has just put a new burden on the hearts of those who have been wronged. We are no longer instructed to wait and see if the other party truly reflects genuine repentance! Instead, each time someone claims to repent, we are *commanded* to forgive. In the kingdom of God, the benefit of the doubt now rests with the perpetrator! Thus, forgiveness ought to flow freely and abundantly in the midst of God's people! Now you can imagine why the disciples ask for an increase of faith! In Matthew and Mark, a small amount of faith can uproot an entire mountain (Matt, 17:19-20, 21:21; Mark 11:22-23; 1 Cor. 13:2; Rev. 8:8). Luke intensifies the impossibility of this radical teaching on forgiveness by comparing it to faith that can make a tree stand firm rooted in nothing but water. However, this does not change that we are servants of Jesus bought at a price to please our master who commanded us to radically forgive in this way! In this study guide, reflect on how forgiveness is not only a pleasantry, but our duty to reflect what Jesus has done for us and is made possible through the Holy Spirit.

What's Going on This Week

This week, Pastor Danny led us into the first week of our new series titled *Uncaged: Living in the Freedom of Grace*. Pastor Danny brought our attention to *Luke 17:1-10* in order to point out to the difficult teaching that Christian forgiveness is unlimited. As you read the scriptures below, recall how Pastor Danny compared forgiveness to eating vegetables; no one wants to, but we do it because we love, trust, and obey Jesus. We know that we have been forgiven by Jesus and we trust in his guidance that suggests it is the best way to live.

Objective #1: Identify any current attitudes or situations dealing with forgiveness (15 – 25 minutes)

Primary Texts: Luke 17:1-10 – Pastor Danny presents each of these texts as common scriptures to which Christians turn when thinking about the topic of forgiveness. After reading the suggested text(s) and hearing a challenging sermon about the high standard Jesus has set for Christian forgiveness, how might the Holy Spirit be challenging you with regard to the topic of forgiveness? Prayer Tip: Document any situations in your group that need to be infused with the forgiveness that only the Holy Spirit provides!

Other Forgiveness Teachings: Matthew 5:38-48, 18:15-21; John 8:1-11; Luke 23:32-33

Objective #2: Share how you would like to grow in forgiveness throughout this series (15 – 25 minutes)

Primary Texts: Exodus 34:6-7; 1 John 1:9; Psalm 103:11-12; Colossians 3:12-13 — Pastor Danny mentions that Christians forgive because the God we love, trust, and serve tells us to forgive! This ought to be done as an act of obedience, as a reflection of who God is, and a model for what his son has done for us on the cross! As we move through this Uncaged series on forgiveness, what are some of the ways you would like to grow in the area of forgiveness? Prayer Tip: Keep track of each member's response as they establish a goal to pursue throughout this series!

- o Pray for an interaction with someone who you can invite into your next group meeting!
